Williston Reservoir spring update

BC Hydro reports that the minimum spring 2024 Williston Reservoir level is currently expected to be above 2162 feet.

This follows some concern earlier this year that the levels would have to drop below 2150 feet. While it says that Williston inflows

remain below average, Hydro notes that on April 22 last year, Williston was ~12 ft. lower.

It says the increase in reservoir levels is associated with "additional system precipitation, continued imports, and milder April weather."

Mystery surrounds quiet off-leash policy change

Almost two years after Council quietly passed a policy changing the default for all local trails to off-leash for dogs, the District of Mackenzie recently confirmed the change and updated its Animal Control web page to reflect it.

Prior to 2022, leashes were required for dogs on all District property except informally for Second Beach and for the small dog park behind Ernie Bodin Centre.

Asked why the new trails policy was not communicated to residents over the last two years, both District staff and Mayor Joan Atkinson declined to answer.

So far three groups from the EBCC will be getting District help with rent in their new locations for a cost of over \$106,000 in the next four years. This figure surpasses the projected cost of the 5-year life safety upgrades at EBCC, an option rejected by Council in 2022.

The Arts Centre and the Autumn Lodge Society receive annual fee-for-service funding but have not requested relocation expenses as yet.

Council approved rent subsidies last week for two more groups having to relocate from the Ernie Bodin Centre (EBCC) this year. The Hospital Auxiliary Thrift Store will receive \$7,800 this year to cover its full rent costs for the year, and smaller subsidies over the next three years. The Thrift Store, which raises money to buy equipment for the hospital, is moving into the basement of Living Joy Church.

The Mackenzie & District Museum reports it will be moving into a unit at 320 Mackenzie Blvd. It will receive \$24,000 this year to cover rent, and \$36,000 over the next three years to subsidize rent.

Council pauses routine MLMCF board re-appointment

Council received its annual recommendation from the McLeod Lake Mackenzie Community Forest Board to re-appoint a director for a renewed three-year term, with this year being Jim Atkinson's turn. Mayor Atkinson, who is married to Mr. Atkinson, removed herself from the vote.

Councillor Wright asked why Council does not solicit nominations for the

Community Forest board as it does for other organizations in town. Councillor Hipkiss, who is herself an appointee to the board, said she does not know why.

Some discussion followed with Councillors Wright and Brumovsky commenting that the lack of an open nomination process discourages participation in the Community Forest by the community. Community

Massage ketchup into your hair and leave on for 15 minutes to get rid of swimmers' green.


Make copper pots or molds gleam

'Policy mystery'...

In an e-mail reply, Corporate Services Director Emily Kaehn stated the new policy was prompted by complaints to Bylaw staff about off-leash dogs, as well as inquiries into where dogs could be taken off leash.

Kaehn did not answer why no public consultation took place for a change which affects trail users of all types in the community.

Resident engagement on town proposals has been a common practice for the District in recent years, and is mentioned as a value in Council's Strategic Priorities.

In 2019, the District spent \$23,575 to create a public engagement process for issues surrounding Little Mac Ski Hill. The strategy was supposed to be broadly applicable for "future issues that require public engagement."

District staff have not indi-

cated what process will be used to determine which, if any, trails will be designated on-leash in the future.

Signage for the Azan Trail, the new town perimeter trail planned and built by MORATA and funded by public grants, went up in winter. There is so far no posted requirement to leash dogs.

A further question to the Mayor and staff about impacts of off-leash dogs in ecologically sensitive areas did not receive a reply by print time.
